

Blood serum

Serum is a yellow fluid that remains after the coagulation of a blood sample, followed by a removal of the blood clot from the sample. It does not contain any cellular elements and clotting factors (such as fibrinogen), which distinguishes it from blood **plasma**. Both plasma and blood serum contain electrolytes, antibodies, hormones and other proteins that do not contribute to blood clotting.
